INTRODUCTION

Introduction - Western Massachusetts Regional Evacuation Plan

Purpose

The purpose of the Western Massachusetts Evacuation Plan is to provide emergency responders on the local, state, and federal levels with the resources necessary for conducting a regional evacuation in as efficient and effective a manner as possible. The plan provides maps and lists of evacuation routes, population centers, infrastructure, and other critical assets. Contact information for municipal and state officials, as well as major employers, schools, and hospitals is also provided.

The plan was completed in conjunction with other emergency plans that have been developed or are currently being developed for western Massachusetts, including a regional sheltering plan and regional communications plan. Data and recommendations from these plans has been integrated into this plan and referenced as needed.

Study Area

This plan serves as a resource for conducting a regional evacuation in western Massachusetts, and pertains to the counties of Berkshire County, Franklin County, Hampshire County, and Hampden County. Contact information for municipalities in Worcester County that border Franklin County, Hampshire County, and Hampden County is also provided, as these towns and cities would potentially be active in any evacuation from western Massachusetts. Information for state resources applicable to the region is also provided.

Future evacuation planning work will involve collaboration with other portions of Massachusetts and surrounding states to ensure coordination and consistency in regional evacuation efforts (see recommendations section).

Acknowledgements

The Western Massachusetts Evacuation Plan was funded and developed by the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council (WRHSAC), with the assistance of the regional planning authorities of Berkshire Regional Planning Commission, the Franklin Regional Council of Governments, and Pioneer Valley Planning Commission.

The WRHSAC and RPAs would like to thank the many emergency officials who assisted in developing this plan, including REPC's, LEPC's, and municipal and state officials.

Planning Assumptions

This plan is based on the following assumptions:

- Identified Evacuation Scenarios This plan is based on evacuation scenarios including:
 - River flooding
 - Dam failure
 - Chemical spill
 - Hurricane

When an unforeseen evacuation scenario occurs, this plan will be modified and adopted as necessary.

- Voluntary Evacuation Since Massachusetts does not have a mandatory evacuation law, citizen compliance is completely voluntary. Citizens who ignore the evacuation will potentially be without safety, fire, and medical services for a period of time.
- Modes of Transportation Most citizens will evacuate using their own vehicles. People without private vehicles will be evacuated primarily with the assistance of friends and neighbors. Public transit systems in western Massachusetts such as the Pioneer Valley Transit Authority, as well as private bus companies such as Peter Pan, will provide transportation services as possible. However, it is important to note that during a large emergency in which many people must be transported, these companies will not have an adequate vehicle stock. Many of the private organizations listed in this plan rely on the same transportation resources, and there are not enough vehicles to accommodate all of these organizations' needs concurrently. When local transportation resources are stretched, outside resources, from other states or from other portions of Massachusetts, will need to be called upon.
- **Traffic Flow** Due to the heavy use of primary evacuation routes, roads will be congested even in ideal weather conditions. Emergency planners should take this into account when considering the time it will take to conduct an evacuation.
- Institutional Evacuation Plans Many private and public institutions, including colleges and universities, hospitals, and private businesses have their own evacuation plans and resources to the maximum extent possible. Public entities in charge of the regional evacuation will assist these institutions, though these institutions should not rely on public resources alone to carry out the evacuation.
- **Regulatory Requirements** Regional evacuations will occur in conformance to this plan and the following state and federal emergency planning legislation and standards:
 - National Incident Management System (NIMS)
 - Pets Evacuation and Standards Act of 2006
 - Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990



Chain of Command

If the emergency is declared by MEMA or FEMA, the procedure for chain of command will follow a topdown approach. In this case, MEMA will be responsible for contacting individual EMDs, who will then take the necessary steps to respond to the disaster in their respective communities.

If the disaster or emergency situation is reported by a local community or citizen, the chain of command will follow a bottom-up reporting approach. In this case, the following flow chart describes the contact procedures that will be followed.

- 1. Problem is reported by citizen to police
- 2. Police take necessary initial steps in response to disaster and contact emergency management director
- Emergency management director takes necessary steps and contacts EMDs in surrounding towns, implements local emergency plan, and contacts MEMA



Evacuation routes were developed based on an analysis of the transportation network, considering factors such as capacity, congestion, and road destinations to develop a hierarchy of primary, secondary, and tertiary routes. Definitions of these routes are as follows:

- Primary state designated highways that carry the largest capacity and provide the most direct route out of the region
- Secondary main arterial roads through towns that carry traffic where primary routes do not exist or provide an alternate route to the primary route
- Tertiary local main roads, used to channel traffic towards secondary and primary evacuation routes

Descriptions of the different types of senior facilities are as follows:

- **Nursing homes** provide the highest level of care, with feeding, bathing, and health services. Residents will be in the greatest need of assistance during an evacuation and will likely require medical assistance.
- **Rest homes** include supportive services, such as help in preparing food or cleaning, without routine medical attention. Residents likely do not have their own transportation but also likely do not need medical assistance.
- Assisted living and continuing care facilities provide supportive services, including help with personal tasks and household management. While residents of these facilities do not necessarily require medical assistance, they also do not necessarily have their own transportation and often rely generally on paratransit services.
- **Continuing care** facilities combine the aspects of nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and rest homes. These facilities offer elderly individuals the ability to age in place by providing several tiers of care at a single location. These residents may have a range of varying medical, mobility, and transportation requirements.

Educational Institutions

Non-Boarding Public Schools

Students who attend non-boarding schools live at home with their families and have local transportation accommodations already provided. Because of this, these students are anticipated to evacuate with their families and not require special considerations. Berkshire County has numerous public schools.

Floods

Due to the nature of our streams and rivers, flooding tends to be more localized; however larger scale flooding does occur along the Housatonic and Hoosic, especially in Sheffield.

The following sections identify hazards associated with critical infrastructure during an evacuation.

Critical infrastructure of the water and energy sectors is currently being studied through a project called the Fusion Center, funded by the Western Massachusetts Homeland Security Advisory Council. The project is examining vulnerabilities that exist to critical infrastructure in the region and which effect emergency response efforts. The purpose of this project is to improve emergency planning in the region by identifying vulnerabilities and making recommendations on how to make facilities safer and more secure.

Bridges with Restrictions

All bridges with a span greater than 20 feet throughout the state undergo routine structural inspection. Using a rating system developed by the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), MassDOT has surveyed and rated the state's bridges.

The MassDOT process identifies bridges that are structurally deficient and functionally obsolete. Bridges that are closed or have weight restrictions are listed below.

Caution should be used for the transport of trucks and other heavy vehicles on restricted bridges.

Dams

According to the Office of Dam Safety:

Poor condition indicates a dam with major structural, operational, maintenance and flood routing capability deficiencies....Unsafe condition indicates a dam whose condition, as determined by the Commissioner, is such that a high risk of failure exists.

Among the deficiencies which would result in this determination are:

- Excessive seepage or piping
- Significant erosion problems
- Inadequate spillway capacity and/or condition of outlet(s)
- Serious structural deficiencies including movement of the structure or major cracking

Traffic Congestion and Identified Bottlenecks

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) defines a congestion bottleneck as "A localized section of highway that experiences reduced speeds and inherent delays due to a recurring operational influence or a nonrecurring impacting event". If congestion occurs along an entire corridor, then the corridor is considered congested. Likewise, if the corridor is experiencing congestion only at a specific location, then the corridor is considered a congestion bottleneck. 




Initiating the Evacuation

Chain of Command

If the emergency is declared by MEMA or FEMA, the procedure for chain of command will follow a topdown approach. In this case, MEMA will be responsible for contacting individual EMDs, who will then take the necessary steps to respond to the disaster in their respective communities.

If the disaster or emergency situation is reported by a local community or citizen, the chain of command will follow a bottom-up reporting approach. In this case, the following flow chart describes the contact procedures that will be followed.

- 1. Problem is reported by citizen to police
- 2. Police take necessary initial steps in response to disaster and contact emergency management director
- 3. Emergency management director takes necessary steps and contacts EMDs in surrounding towns, implements local emergency plan, and contacts MEMA




Evacuation routes were developed based on an analysis of the transportation network, considering factors such as capacity, congestion, and road destinations to develop a hierarchy of primary, secondary, and tertiary routes. Definitions of these routes are as follows:

- Primary state designated highways that carry the largest capacity and provide the most direct route out of the region
- Secondary main arterial roads through towns that carry traffic where primary routes do not exist or provide an alternate route to the primary route
- Tertiary local main roads, used to channel traffic towards secondary and primary evacuation routes

Descriptions of the different types of senior facilities are as follows:

Nursing homes provide the highest level of care, with feeding, bathing, and health services. Residents will be in the greatest need of assistance during an evacuation and will likely require medical assistance.

Rest homes include supportive services, such as help in preparing food or cleaning, without routine medical attention. Residents likely do not have their own transportation but also likely do not need medical assistance.

Assisted living and continuing care facilities provide supportive services, including help with personal tasks and household management. While residents of these facilities do not necessarily require medical assistance, they also do not necessarily have their own transportation and often rely generally on paratransit services.

Continuing care facilities combine the aspects of nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and rest homes. These facilities offer elderly individuals the ability to age in place by providing several tiers of care at a single location. These residents may have a range of varying medical, mobility, and transportation requirements.

Senior Housing Complexes

There are 9 senior housing complexes in Franklin County. It should be noted that not all of the housing facilities listed are exclusively senior housing, but have been identified as likely having elderly populations who may need assistance evacuating.

Educational Institutions

Non-Boarding Public Schools

Students who attend non-boarding schools live at home with their families and have local transportation accommodations already provided. For Evacuations that occur when school is not in session, these students are anticipated to evacuate with their families and do not require special considerations. For an evacuation while school is in session, all public schools should have evacuation plans in place, as required by the state. Preschools are also required through the state to have evacuation plans. These plans should be reviewed regularly, and updated as needed. Schools should assure that adequate transportation is available for a large scale evacuation of more than one school in a region (for example, in the case of a dam failure on the Deerfield River).

The biggest issue may be traffic congestion due to a mass evacuation at GCC, where there is only one road in and out of campus.

Natural Features

The following are a list of natural features possibly relevant to evacuations in Franklin County. More information about these natural features can be found in the Hazard Mitigation Plans for Franklin County, accessible on town websites or by contacting the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG) Natural Resources Program Manager.

Floods

Flooding is one of the most common natural hazards in Franklin County. The Connecticut, Deerfield, and Millers Rivers are major waterways that bisect the county east to west and north to south. Numerous smaller rivers and tributaries feed into these larger rivers. The hilly terrain in the higher elevations of the county creates the conditions for flash floods during large rainstorms, causing erosion, road washouts, and potential personal property damage. Much of the farmland in the lowland areas of the county is within the 100-year floodplain. Many of the villages and urban centers in the region are also located adjacent to rivers, which once powered mills, and are susceptible to flooding. These areas may need to be evacuated during large flood events. Flooding also can make evacuation difficult due to washed out roadways. Even primary routes are susceptible to damage from flooding, as demonstrated by Tropical Storm Irene in August 2011, when both Interstate 91 and Route 2 were impacted.

The probability of a 100-year flood is 1-percent chance of occurring in any given year. The probability of a 500-year flood is 0.2 percent chance of occurring in any given year.

Geographic Features

River valleys and hills characterize the main geographic features of Franklin County. The Connecticut River Valley is flat and wide in the southern section of the county in the towns of Sunderland, Whately, Deerfield, and Montague, and gradually becomes narrower in the central and northern parts of the county as steep hills and slopes rise up on either side of the river. The Berkshires dominate the western portion of the county, with roads following steep river valleys or climbing over mountains, creating formidable driving conditions during poor weather. The eastern part of the county consists of heavily forested areas and rolling highlands. The northern end of the Quabbin Reservoir creates a barrier for travelling east from the south-eastern section of the county. Franklin County is heavily forested overall. Main roads tend to follow rivers and streams, and are therefore very susceptible to damages from flooding, as mentioned above.

Critical Infrastructure

The following sections identify hazards associated with critical infrastructure during an evacuation.

Critical infrastructure of the water and energy sectors is currently being studied through a project called the Fusion Center, funded by the Western Massachusetts Homeland Security Advisory Council. The project is examining vulnerabilities that exist to critical infrastructure in the region and which effect emergency response efforts. The purpose of this project is to improve emergency planning in the region by identifying vulnerabilities and making recommendations on how to make facilities safer and more secure.

Bridges with Restrictions or Closures

All bridges with a span greater than 20 feet throughout the state undergo routine structural inspection. Using a rating system developed by the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), MassDOT has surveyed and rated the state's bridges.

The MassDOT process identifies bridges that are structurally deficient and functionally obsolete. Bridges that are closed or have weight restrictions are listed below.

Caution should be used for the transport of trucks and other heavy vehicles on restricted bridges.

Culverts

Culverts are any sewer or drain crossing under a road or embankment that is less than 20 feet. More information on identified problem culverts can be found in the Hazard Mitigation plans for individual towns in western Massachusetts. A project to assess strengths and weaknesses in critical infrastructure in specific towns in western Massachusetts is currently being conducted by the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council.

Dams

According to the Office of Dam Safety:

Poor condition indicates a dam with major structural, operational, maintenance and flood routing capability deficiencies....Unsafe condition indicates a dam whose condition, as determined by the Commissioner, is such that a high risk of failure exists.

Among the deficiencies which would result in this determination are:

- Excessive seepage or piping
- Significant erosion problems
- Inadequate spillway capacity and/or condition of outlet(s)
- Serious structural deficiencies including movement of the structure or major cracking

The state has three hazard classifications for dams:

- High Hazard Potential: Dams located where failure or improper operation will likely cause loss of life and serious damage to homes, industrial or commercial facilities, important Private utilities, main highways, or railroads.
- Significant Hazard Potential: Dams located where failure or improper operation may cause loss of life and damage to homes, industrial or commercial facilities, secondary highways or railroads or cause interruption of use or service of relatively important facilities.
- Low Hazard Potential: Dams located where failure or improper operation may cause minimal property damage to others. Loss of life is not expected.

Owners of dams are required to hire a qualified engineer to inspect and report results using the following inspection schedule:

- Low Hazard Potential dams 10 years
- Significant Hazard Potential dams 5 years
- High Hazard Potential dams 2 years

The time intervals represent the maximum time between inspections. More frequent inspections may be performed at the discretion of the state.

There are 15 dams in Franklin County in poor or unsafe condition as of January 2011, as found by the state Office of Dam Safety.

Federal Energy Regulatory Commission Regulated Dams

Dams and reservoirs licensed and subject to inspection by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) are excluded from the provisions of the state regulations provided that all FERC-approved periodic inspection reports are provided to the DCR. FERC inspections of high and significant hazard projects are conducted on a yearly basis.

FERC requires that an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) be created and updated annually for licensing of hydropower facilities. The primary purpose of an EAP is to "provide operating and mobilization and notification procedures to be followed in the case of an emergency" such as a sudden release of water caused by a natural disaster or accident.²

The following dams in Franklin County are regulated by FERC.

Two FERC regulated dams upstream of Franklin County are also of concern. The Moore Dam on the Connecticut River, located in Littleton, NH, and the Harriman Dam on the Deerfield River, located near Whitingham, VT, pose a significant hazard to Franklin County towns along these rivers in the event of a dam failure. A catastrophic failure of either of these high hazard dams would likely result in the cascading failure of all the downstream dams (both high and low hazard dams), resulting in widespread flooding of downstream areas in a matter of hours. A failure of one of these dams could occur with very little warning or preparation time resulting in the potential for incalculable property damage and significant loss of life in every town on the Deerfield River or Connecticut River. Therefore, emergency responders should review inundation areas and identify possible evacuation routes as well as familiarizing themselves with the contents of the Moore Dam and the Harriman Dam Emergency Action Plans. More information on a Harriman Dam failure is located in the Scenarios That May Impact the County section, below.

Power Plants

Other than the hydroelectric facilities that are listed under the FERC-regulated dams above, there are no major power plants within Franklin County. The Yankee Rowe nuclear power plant operated for over three decades as a power generating facility until 1992. Since then the plant has been disassembled and was officially decommissioned in 2007. However spent fuel from the plant's operation is still stored on site adjacent to the Sherman Reservoir on the Deerfield River in Rowe. The fuel is stored in Nuclear Regulatory Commission – approved dry canisters and casks made of steel and concrete, which are placed on a concrete pad on the site. The stored fuel is monitored 24 hours a day. The fuel storage site is within the inundation zone for the Harriman Dam, which is located approximately 6.5 miles upstream from the site. According to the Yankee Atomic Electric Company, which maintains the fuel storage site, the type of container that the fuel is stored in has been tested to withstand submersion under 50 feet of water for 8 hours, among other safety tests.³

The Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant is located on the Connecticut River in Vernon, Vermont, near the Vermont/Massachusetts border. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission recently extended the plant's operating license for 20 more years, which expired in March 2012. The official evacuation zone for the plant is a 10 mile radius around the plant, encompassing several Franklin County towns. Emergency personnel within these towns participate in regular trainings that evaluate shelters, evacuation procedures, traffic control, and what equipment and materials would be needed in the event of an accident at the plant. The MEMA Agawam Region 3 and 4 office is set up to operate as an emergency operations center in the event of an accident at the plant. Greenfield Community College is a designated stopover point for evacuees from facilities such as schools and camps, with the University of Massachusetts, Amherst designated as the final evacuation destination.

The 1986 Chernobyl nuclear accident, which was caused by human error, and the 2011 tsunami and earthquake in Japan that damaged the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant, demonstrate the large geographic extent that could be impacted by an accident. Municipalities outside of the 10 mile evacuation zone need to be just as prepared for an evacuation in the event of an accident at either the Vermont Yankee or Yankee Rowe facilities.

Railroads

Franklin County has approximately 93 route miles of railroad, which are broken down into two north-south routes, one east-west route, and an east-west connector at the East Deerfield Rail Yard, which is one of the largest railyards in New England. There are two other minor rail yards in the county still in use in South Deerfield and Millers Falls. The 2006 Regional Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan (HMEP) developed by the Franklin County REPC estimated that there are 100 to 130 train cars with hazardous materials passing through the county each day. Since the development of the plan, it is estimated that this number has increased. Railroads travel through densely populated neighborhoods and town centers, and along roads and rivers. Hazardous material rail spills have occurred in Franklin County in the past, and are often the focus of trainings and exercises. The Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP) for each town contains Standard Operating Procedures for a hazardous material spill. The Franklin County Hazardous Material Emergency Plan (HMEP) is also a resource for Franklin County communities to use to prepare for a hazardous material accident.

Traffic Bottlenecks

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) defines a congestion bottleneck as "A localized section of highway that experiences reduced speeds and inherent delays due to a recurring operational influence or a nonrecurring impacting event". If congestion occurs along an entire corridor, then the corridor is considered congested. Likewise, if the corridor is experiencing congestion only at a specific location, then the corridor is considered a congestion bottleneck. The following list of projected bottlenecks and congestion points was generated by FRCOG's Transportation Planning Engineer based on knowledge of traffic volumes, traffic flow, and intersection geometry in Franklin County.

There is a limited variety of transportation options available for moving people during a mass evacuation. Unless organizations have their own fleet of vans and buses most entities contract with Dufour Tours.

The following transportation company should be contacted to determine the options they can provide during an evacuation.

Failure of the Harriman Dam

Franklin County towns that fall within the Harriman Dam inundation area are Monroe, Rowe, Charlemont, Buckland, Shelburne, Deerfield, Greenfield, Montague, Sunderland, and Whately. The more populated areas that would need to be evacuated in the event of a dam failure include Charlemont village center, the village of Shelburne Falls, areas of downtown Greenfield, Montague City and portions of Turners Falls, Old Deerfield, and Sunderland village center. A number of public and private schools, and important municipal facilities, are within or immediately adjacent to the inundation zone. The time that it will take for flood waters to reach various populated areas ranges from just over an hour for Charlemont village center, to approximately 3 hours 40 minutes in Sunderland.⁴

In 2010 the WRHSAC funded a project through the University of Massachusetts Transportation Center (UMTC), in conjunction with the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG), to model the impact of a failure of the Harriman Dam on the regional transportation network in order to inform future evacuation planning efforts. Following the UMTC report, the FRCOG prepared specific recommendations for the towns within the inundation area, to be incorporated into town evacuation plans. Both reports are available from the FRCOG. In 2011, TransCanada, owner of the Harriman Dam, supplied EMDs in the towns within the inundation area a revised Emergency Action Plan (EAP) for the dam, including updated inundation mapping based on more accurate mapping techniques than previously used. The EAP includes a notification chart and emergency contact information for reaching TransCanada and its Regional EOC (once activated) during an emergency. In the event of a dam failure, Shelburne Control would be notified first, along with other downstream dispatch centers.


Nuclear Incident


The Yankee Rowe nuclear power plant operated for over three decades as a power generating facility until 1992. Since then the plant has been disassembled and was officially decommissioned in 2007. However spent fuel from the plant's operation is still stored on site adjacent to the Sherman Reservoir on the Deerfield River in Rowe. The fuel is stored in Nuclear Regulatory Commission – approved dry canisters and casks made of steel and concrete, which are placed on a concrete pad on the site. The stored fuel is monitored 24 hours a day. The fuel storage site is within the inundation zone for the Harriman Dam, which is located approximately 6.5 miles upstream from the site. According to the Yankee Atomic Electric Company, which maintains the fuel storage site, the type of container that the fuel is stored in has been tested to withstand submersion under 50 feet of water for 8 hours, among other safety tests.⁵ However, if some type of incident occurred that compromised the storage casks, towns within a 10 mile radius of the former plant that might be affected include Colrain, Heath, Rowe, Monroe, Charlemont, Hawley, and Buckland.

The Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant is located on the Connecticut River in Vernon, Vermont, near the Vermont/Massachusetts border. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission recently extended the plant's operating license for 20 more years, which expired in March 2012. The official evacuation zone for the plant is a 10 mile radius around the plant, encompassing several Franklin County towns, including portions of Warwick, Northfield, Gill, Leyden, and all of Bernardston. Emergency personnel within these towns participate in regular trainings that evaluate shelters, evacuation procedures, traffic control, and what equipment and materials would be needed in the event of an accident at the plant. If a more extensive evacuation were ordered, for example within a 25 mile radius, all Franklin County towns would potentially be affected. The MEMA Agawam Region 3 and 4 office is set up to operate as an emergency operations center in the event of an accident at the plant. Greenfield Community College is a designated stopover point for evacues from facilities such as schools and camps, with the University of Massachusetts, Amherst designated as the final evacuation destination.


Initiating the Evacuation

Chain of Command

If the emergency is declared by MEMA or FEMA, the procedure for chain of command will follow a topdown approach. In this case, MEMA will be responsible for contacting individual EMDs, who will then take the necessary steps to respond to the disaster in their respective communities.

If the disaster or emergency situation is reported by a local community or citizen, the chain of command will follow a bottom-up reporting approach. In this case, the following flow chart describes the contact procedures that will be followed.

- 4. Problem is reported by citizen to police
- 5. Police take necessary initial steps in response to disaster and contact emergency management director
- 6. Emergency management director takes necessary steps and contacts EMDs in surrounding towns, implements local emergency plan, and contacts MEMA




Evacuation routes were developed based on an analysis of the transportation network, considering factors such as capacity, congestion, and road destinations to develop a hierarchy of primary, secondary, and tertiary routes. Definitions of these routes are as follows:

- Primary state designated highways that carry the largest capacity and provide the most direct route out of the region
- Secondary main arterial roads through towns that carry traffic where primary routes do not exist or provide an alternate route to the primary route
- Tertiary local main roads, used to channel traffic towards secondary and primary evacuation routes

Descriptions of the different types of senior facilities are as follows:

- **Nursing homes** provide the highest level of care, with feeding, bathing, and health services. Residents will be in the greatest need of assistance during an evacuation and will likely require medical assistance.
- **Rest homes** include supportive services, such as help in preparing food or cleaning, without routine medical attention. Residents likely do not have their own transportation but also likely do not need medical assistance.
- Assisted living and continuing care facilities provide supportive services, including help with personal tasks and household management. While residents of these facilities do not necessarily require medical assistance, they also do not necessarily have their own transportation and often rely generally on paratransit services.
- **Continuing care** facilities combine the aspects of nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and rest homes. These facilities offer elderly individuals the ability to age in place by providing several tiers of care at a single location. These residents may have a range of varying medical, mobility, and transportation requirements.

Educational Institutions

Non-Boarding Public Schools

Students who attend non-boarding schools live at home with their families and have local transportation accommodations already provided. For Evacuations that occur when school is not in session, these students are anticipated to evacuate with their families and do not require special considerations. For an evacuation while school is in session, all public schools should have evacuation plans in place, as required by the state. Preschools are also required through the state to have evacuation plans. These plans should be reviewed regularly, and updated as needed. Schools should assure that adequate transportation is available for a large scale evacuation of more than one school in a region.

Floods

Flooding is an identified problem in several areas. In Hampden County, the 100 and 500 year flood areas are centered on the Connecticut River.

The probability of a 100-year flood is 1-percent chance of occurring in any given year. The probability of a 500-year flood is 0.2 percent chance of occurring in any given year.

Both levels of flooding would result in widespread flooding in Hampden County and affect residences and businesses. In addition, the flooding would result in roadway closures in the region and impact any potential necessary evacuations.

The primary community identified in Hampden County as being affected by the 100-year flood is Westfield, specifically along the commercial and industrial areas along Route 20 and Union Street. The CSX rail line through Westfield could also be flooded at its lowest points. During a 500-year flood, downtown Westfield, as well as Routes 10, 20, and 202 could also be closed. In both flooding events, the Westfield River would be the cause.

Ramps for Interstate-91 are at a low elevation near downtown Springfield and could potentially flood during a 100-year or 500-year storm.

Bodies of Water

Connecticut River Westfield River The following sections identify hazards associated with critical infrastructure during an evacuation.

Critical infrastructure of the water and energy sectors is currently being studied through a project called the Fusion Center, funded by the Western Massachusetts Homeland Security Advisory Council. The project is examining vulnerabilities that exist to critical infrastructure in the region and which effect emergency response efforts. The purpose of this project is to improve emergency planning in the region by identifying vulnerabilities and making recommendations on how to make facilities safer and more secure.

Bridges with Restrictions or Closures

All bridges with a span greater than 20 feet throughout the state undergo routine structural inspection. Using a rating system developed by the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), MassDOT has surveyed and rated the state's bridges.

The MassDOT process identifies bridges that are structurally deficient and functionally obsolete. Bridges that are closed or have weight restrictions are listed below.

Caution should be used for the transport of trucks and other heavy vehicles on restricted bridges.

Culverts

Culverts are any sewer or drain crossing under a road or embankment that is less than 20 feet. More information on identified problem culverts can be found in the Hazard Mitigation plans for individual towns in western Massachusetts. A project to assess strengths and weaknesses in critical infrastructure in specific towns in western Massachusetts is currently being conducted by the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council.

Dams

According to the Office of Dam Safety:

Poor condition indicates a dam with major structural, operational, maintenance and flood routing capability deficiencies....Unsafe condition indicates a dam whose condition, as determined by the Commissioner, is such that a high risk of failure exists.

Among the deficiencies which would result in this determination are:

- Excessive seepage or piping
- Significant erosion problems
- Inadequate spillway capacity and/or condition of outlet(s)
- Serious structural deficiencies including movement of the structure or major cracking

There are 14 dams in Hampden County in poor or unsafe condition, as found by the state Office of Dam Safety.

Traffic Congestion and Identified Bottlenecks

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) defines a congestion bottleneck as "A localized section of highway that experiences reduced speeds and inherent delays due to a recurring operational influence or a nonrecurring impacting event". If congestion occurs along an entire corridor, then the corridor is considered congested. Likewise, if the corridor is experiencing congestion only at a specific location, then the corridor is considered a congestion bottleneck.

Colleges with large commuting populations will not have as significant an impact on an evacuation scenario, since distance traveled for these students and their families is likely much shorter. Because of this, it is difficult to determine an estimate of the number of gradutes attending.

The Big E

The Big E, which takes place at the fairgrounds adjacent to Memorial Drive in West Springfield, attracts over 100,000 people per day. The 17-day event runs from mid to late September. Plans for severe weather at the Big E involve transferring people into indoor areas on the fairgrounds. During an emergency neceissating removal of fairgoers from the fairgrounds, the event's vehicle stock would be used. The Brimfield Antique Show is held at multiple times of the year along both sides of Route 20 in Brimfield. The event includes dozens of vendors, with most opening each day at 6:00 a.m. and close at approximately 6:00 p.m. The event often attracts over 100,000 people and during the event travel along Route 20 is severely limited. 
Westover Air Show

The MassMutual Center, located at 1277 Main Street in Springfield is a multi-purpose arena that holds a wide variety of events throughout the year, including basketball, hockey, and music concerts. The facility is home to the Springfield Falcons minor league hockey team, which plays during the fall and winter, and Springfield Armor minor league basketball team, which plays during the winter and spring. The facility's capacity is approximately 6,500 for hockey games, 7,500 for basketball games, and 8,500 for concerts. HAMPDEN COUNTY POPULATION DENSITY




Initiating the Evacuation

Chain of Command

If the emergency is declared by MEMA or FEMA, the procedure for chain of command will follow a topdown approach. In this case, MEMA will be responsible for contacting individual EMDs, who will then take the necessary steps to respond to the disaster in their respective communities.

If the disaster or emergency situation is reported by a local community or citizen, the chain of command will follow a bottom-up reporting approach. In this case, the following flow chart describes the contact procedures that will be followed.

- 1. Problem is reported by citizen to police
- 2. Police take necessary initial steps in response to disaster and contact emergency management director
- 3. Emergency management director takes necessary steps and contacts EMDs in surrounding towns, implements local emergency plan, and contacts MEMA




Evacuation routes for individual municipalities are described below.

Evacuation routes were developed based on an analysis of the transportation network, considering factors such as capacity, congestion, and road destinations to develop a hierarchy of primary, secondary, and tertiary routes. Definitions of these routes are as follows:

- Primary state designated highways that carry the largest capacity and provide the most direct route out of the region
- Secondary main arterial roads through towns that carry traffic where primary routes do not exist or provide an alternate route to the primary route
- Tertiary local main roads, used to channel traffic towards secondary and primary evacuation routes



Descriptions of the different types of senior facilities are as follows:

- **Nursing homes** provide the highest level of care, with feeding, bathing, and health services. Residents will be in the greatest need of assistance during an evacuation and will likely require medical assistance.
- **Rest homes** include supportive services, such as help in preparing food or cleaning, without routine medical attention. Residents likely do not have their own transportation but also likely do not need medical assistance.
- Assisted living and continuing care facilities provide supportive services, including help with personal tasks and household management. While residents of these facilities do not necessarily require medical assistance, they also do not necessarily have their own transportation and often rely generally on paratransit services.
- **Continuing care** facilities combine the aspects of nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and rest homes. These facilities offer elderly individuals the ability to age in place by providing several tiers of care at a single location. These residents may have a range of varying medical, mobility, and transportation requirements.

Educational Institutions

Non-Boarding Public High Schools

Students who attend non-boarding schools live at home with their families and have local transportation accommodations already provided. For evacuations that occur when school is not in session, these students are anticipated to evacuate with their families and do not require special considerations. For an evacuation while school is in session, all public schools should have evacuation plans in place, as required by the state. Preschools are also required through the state to have evacuation plans. These plans should be reviewed regularly, and updated as needed. Schools should assure that adequate transportation is available for a large scale evacuation of more than one school in a region.

There are five colleges in Hampshire County. The largest of these is the University of Massachusetts – Amherst. In addition to a large student enrollment, the University of Massachusetts has the largest faculty. Any necessary evacuation during the Fall, Winter, or Spring will need to accommodate the large number of students that need transport away from the university. A large number of students at the University of Massachusetts own their own cars and will be able to transport themselves during an evacuation. However, most students at the other colleges do not have cars and will need transportation assistance.

Floods

Flooding is an identified problem in several areas. In Hampshire County, the 100 and 500 year flood areas are centered on the Connecticut River.

The probability of a 100-year flood is 1-percent chance of occurring in any given year. The probability of a 500-year flood is 0.2 percent chance of occurring in any given year.

Both levels of flooding would result in widespread flooding in Hampshire County and affect residences and businesses. In addition, the flooding would result in roadway closures in the region and impact any potential necessary evacuations.

The primary two communities identified in Hampshire County as being affected by the 100-year flood are the western portion of Hadley and the eastern portion of Northampton. Routes 5, 9, and 47 would potentially be affected by flooding on the Connecticut River.

A 500-year flood would cause similar flooding with additional land flooded in Hadley.

The following sections identify hazards associated with critical infrastructure during an evacuation.

Critical infrastructure of the water and energy sectors is currently being studied through a project called the Fusion Center, funded by the Western Massachusetts Homeland Security Advisory Council. The project is examining vulnerabilities that exist to critical infrastructure in the region and which effect emergency response efforts. The purpose of this project is to improve emergency planning in the region by identifying vulnerabilities and making recommendations on how to make facilities safer and more secure.

Bridges with Restrictions or Closures

All bridges with a span greater than 20 feet throughout the state undergo routine structural inspection. Using a rating system developed by the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), MassDOT has surveyed and rated the state's bridges.

The MassDOT process identifies bridges that are structurally deficient and functionally obsolete. Bridges that are closed or have weight restrictions are listed below.

Caution should be used for the transport of trucks and other heavy vehicles on restricted bridges.

Culverts

Culverts are any sewer or drain crossing under a road or embankment that is less than 20 feet. More information on identified problem culverts can be found in the Hazard Mitigation plans for individual towns in western Massachusetts. A project to assess strengths and weaknesses in critical infrastructure in specific towns in western Massachusetts is currently being conducted by the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council.

Dams

According to the Office of Dam Safety:

Poor condition indicates a dam with major structural, operational, maintenance and flood routing capability deficiencies....Unsafe condition indicates a dam whose condition, as determined by the Commissioner, is such that a high risk of failure exists.

Among the deficiencies which would result in this determination are:

- Excessive seepage or piping
- Significant erosion problems
- Inadequate spillway capacity and/or condition of outlet(s)
- Serious structural deficiencies including movement of the structure or major cracking

There are 13 dams in Hampshire County in poor or unsafe condition, as found by the state Office of Dam Safety.

Traffic Congestion and Identified Bottlenecks


Games at McGuirk Alumni Stadium


Events at Mullins Center



Regional Resources - Western Massachusetts Regional Evacuation Plan

Evacuation Scenarios

BRPC, FRCOG, and PVPC have conducted evacuation planning studies using their regional transportation models through a process known as dynamic traffic assignment. The TransCAD modeling software was used to analyze each evacuation scenario and estimate the level of traffic on major roadways as a result of the scenario. It should be noted that the transportation models typically exclude most local roads. Only major arterials and collector roads are considered. The Dynamic Traffic Assignment process when combined with the regional transportation model allows specific travel conditions to be implemented at certain times and varying durations. As a result, the impact of a roadway closure during peak travel periods can be simulated and information on the anticipated impacts can be analyzed. The following summarizes the major evacuation scenarios studied using the regional transportation models. Communities may obtain more information on the specific results of each scenario or work to develop other evacuation scenarios by contacting their respective regional planning agency.

Hurricane

Two different Hurricane scenarios were studied using the regional models. The first scenario assumed a major hurricane that requires a full evacuation of all four of the Western Massachusetts counties. The second assumed a hurricane that takes a more westerly path and only impacts Berkshire County.

Four County Hurricane

The four county hurricane scenario was assumed to split the region in two, requiring an evacuation to both the east and west. The scenario was created to mimic the path of the New England Hurricane of 1938. This hurricane made landfall as a category three hurricane in New York. The storm moved its way up through Connecticut, moved through the center of Massachusetts, and ended as a severe storm in Ontario. A major assumption of this scenario is that residents of the four county area are given 24 hours notice to evacuate and that all residents comply with the evacuation order. While the scenario did show it is possible to evacuate the region in a 24 hour period, it did identify roadways such as I-90 to the east that may be overly congested during an evacuation event.

Berkshire County Hurricane

The Berkshire County hurricane scenario expanded on the four county hurricane scenario with more specific evacuation scenario as detailed below:

At 10:00 am on a Thursday in September, a hurricane warning has been released for Berkshire County. The hurricane is expected to reach Berkshire County at 10:00 am on Friday, giving the population 24 hours to evacuate. All towns in Berkshire County need to evacuate to the west, as there is a chance the hurricane tract will move eastward. Seasonal residents and visitors are minimal and will evacuate with the general population. Colleges are in session and have to be evacuated. Schools need to send their students home immediately so they can be evacuated by their parents.

The scenario assumes that a normal day of trips of is taken before the evacuation order is called. As a result, people are leaving their homes to evacuate while people are also returning home from work. Again, the scenario did show it is possible to evacuate Berkshire County in a 24 hour period, however it did identify a number of potentially congested roadways that may be overly taxed during an evacuation event. The scenario also identified a number of areas that may require buses to assist in evacuation efforts based on vehicles per household data.

University of Massachusetts – Amherst Campus Evacuation

A severe snowstorm occurs, necessitating the evacuation of the University of Massachusetts Amherst campus. A phased evacuation is modeled using current university vehicle and housing data. The scenario simulates evacuation assuming complete compliance with the existing University evacuation protocol. This is compared to a second scenario assuming no compliance to the University evacuation plan. The large number of on-campus parking facilities located along a roadway network with limited capacity presents a significant challenge in the case of an emergency evacuation. The scenario provided valuable information on the potential traffic impacts of police controlled versus a non-police controlled evacuation. The scenario also identified a number of exit points that may require additional police officers to assist in evacuation efforts.

It should be noted, this scenario did not perfectly represent campus roadway conditions. Pedestrian traffic, vehicles belonging to students that live on-campus, and PVTA buses were not included in the analysis and thus their impacts are not accounted for. The scenario also only considered the campus road network and did not include an assessment of the impacts of the evacuation surrounding roadways in the Towns of Amherst and Hadley.

Flooding

Franklin County – Harriman Dam Scenario

A four-stage evacuation scenario was analyzed under this scenario to determine the impact of the failure of the Harriman Dam - a hydroelectric dam in the town of Whitingham, VT. The scenario assumes the flood runs upstream to downstream after the Harriman Dam breaks and takes time to get to different points along the Deerfield River with residents evacuating in a progressive manner based water inundation levels. The flood is estimated to take approximately six-hours to reach the border between Franklin and Hampshire County. Sometime during the fifth hour after dam breaks, the flood joins the Connecticut River begins to accelerate. As a result, it only takes one hour for flood waters to reach the border of Franklin County.

The scenario identified a number of roadways that may not be accessible due to flooding. As the flood progresses, less roadways are available for evacuation use. This required the identification of many local roads that may need to be utilized to route traffic out of the inundation area. While this scenario did not require a complete evacuation of the region, it did assist in identifying the areas that could be prone to flooding and the measures that would be required to assist in evacuation efforts.

City of Springfield Flooding

Three flooding scenarios were developed by the City of Springfield which established the identification of site specific challenges and sensitive receptors. The three scenarios identified for flood evacuation analysis are located in three different areas of the city. The first scenario is located in the northeast corner of the city between the Chicopee River and Worcester Street. The second flood scenario is located in the South End neighborhood in the southwest corner of the city along the Connecticut River. The third flood scenario covers the Brightwood neighborhood in the northwest corner of the City as well as all locations encompassed by flood scenario two.

The City's Predisaster Mitigation Map was utilized to identify areas that could be impacted by flooding. A number of assumptions were made to assess the impacts of each scenario on sensitive receptors that would be impacted by a flood. Changes in traffic flow were estimated for each scenario based on the identification of roadways that would not be accessible due to flooding. The effectiveness of existing detour routes was also analyzed and recommendations were made on additional resources that may be required during an actual evacuation.

I-91 Chemical Spill Evacuation

A chemical spill occurring in the afternoon peak hours on Interstate 91 in the vicinity of Exit 12 resulting in the complete closure of the highway in both directions. This scenario identifies the impact of the unanticipated closure of I-91 on downtown Springfield and the regional roadway network. The scenario assumes that a two mile segment along Interstate 91 between Exits 10 and 12 is completely closed to vehicular traffic. The closure blocks all traffic from Springfield to the Massachusetts Turnpike, Interstate 90. For planning purposes, the incident begins at 4:00 PM and lasts for three hours.

In general, the length of road closure due to a chemical spill is much longer than what is assumed under this scenario. A chemical spill can last for several days until the area is safe. Also, the range of the hazard zone would likely extend beyond a single road based on the type of hazardous material released and the extent of the spill. The objective of this scenario, however, is to establish a framework for an unexpected emergency during peak travel periods. The scenario provided useful information on potential diversion routes for traffic using I-91 and the number of vehicles that might be trapped on I-91 between exits 9 and 13 as a result of the chemical spill.

CEMP Plans

Through Massachusetts state mandate, every community is required to complete a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. The electronic CEMP application, known as eCEMP, allows communities to access these plans online through the state's website:

Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plans for 21 of 26 Franklin County towns are currently in the process of being updated and reviewed by MEMA and FEMA. The plans for the remaining five towns will be updated beginning in 2013. These plans are available by request from the FRCOG Natural Resources Program, or from town administrators and EMDs.

Communicating with the Public

Effective communication with the public is an essential component of any evacuation, in order to minimize misinformation and ensure that large groups of people are able to travel in an organized manner. The following guidelines for communicating with the public have been organized into the various phases of an evacuation: before, during and after. These procedures are adapted from the recommendations made in the Emergency Communications Plan developed by WHRSAC in 2012, which can be found at http://wrhsac.org/resources/resource-documents/.

Pre-Evacuation

- 1. Inventory available communications equipment and ensure it is ready to be utilized as necessary.
- 2. Ensure emergency staff, including police, fire, and emergency management officials are on call and prepared to conduct an evacuation.
- **3.** Review relevant emergency planning documents, including local CEMP plans, hazard mitigation plans, and this regional evacuation plan.
- **4.** Contact potential foreign language and American Sign Language interpreters in western Massachusetts to provide assistance.
- 5. Ensure that critical population centers, including major employers, schools and universities, and hospitals, are aware of the potential of an evacuation and begin to prepare accordingly.
- 6. Alert the public, using multiple communication methods, about the potential of an upcoming evacuation and need to leave their homes.

During the Evacuation

- Use available alert technology, including Reverse 911 and the MEMA smart phone alert system. A full
 list of available resources is included in the WRHSAC Regional Communications Plan. In the case of a
 power outage, communication will be severely impaired, and low-tech methods of alerting the public
 will be necessary, including having local emergency officials going door-to-door.
- 2. Monitor social media posts made by the public in order to collect intelligence on evacuation progress and gauge public opinion.
- 3. Communicate with reporters, television stations, and radio stations in order to promote the broadcasting of accurate information.
- 4. Ensure that general public announcements are also targeted towards specific populations, including those with limited English proficiency or functional needs.

5. Coordinate evacuation efforts with surrounding states (as applicable) to make them aware of evacuees who are present in their jurisdictions.

Post-Evacuation


- 1. Notify media outlets to announce that the public is allowed to return to their homes.
- 2. For residents who were relocated to medical care facilities or shelters because of a lack of private transportation, provide transportation back to homes.

Recommendations - Western Massachusetts Regional Evacuation Plan

Recommendations

Through the development of this plan, the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council has developed the following set of recommendations:

- Development of Evacuation Plans Various public and private institutions are required by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to develop and maintain evacuation plans. However, not all organizations in western Massachusetts have plans. Local Emergency Management Directors (EMDs) should reach out and establish relationships with the schools, major employers, camps, etc. in their respective towns, in order to facilitate the development of individual evacuation plans, where necessary.
- 2. Transportation Services As discussed in the beginning of this plan in the Planning Assumptions Section, almost every section in each county utilizes one local commercial bus line for their evacuation. None of these organizations have made a formal agreement with bus companies. While it is likely that bus companies would provide as much assistance during an evacuation as possible, these companies simply do not have the stock to be able to accommodate an evacuation from every organization. Emergency management officials and private institutions that have evacuation plans should sit down with representatives from bus companies to determine a set of realistic expectations for what transportation resources can be provided, so that surprises will not occur when an evacuation is needed.
- 3. Integration with Other Evacuation Plans Emergency officials in western Massachusetts should continue to work with officials in neighboring states to coordinate evacuation planning protocol. Local, regional and state emergency officials should work with each other to assist in developing a comprehensive statewide evacuation protocol.
- 4. Increase the Information Included Work should continue with emergency officials in western Massachusetts to determine other resources and data that would be useful to have during an evacuation and for inclusion in the plan. In addition, continue to collect data for already identified resources and fill in any existing information gaps. Additionally, work to develop a set of electronic evacuation maps that are more interactive – for example, providing the ability for emergency officials to click on a map feature, such as a bridge, and obtain more information about it.
- 5. Regular Updates Procedures should be developed by the WRHSAC and MEMA to perform regular updates to the information includes in this plan. Specifically, the status of bridges will need to be updated on a regular basis to provide the best possible information to EMD's on weight restrictions and closures that could impact regional evacuation routes. Similarly, information on sensitive receptors must be updated regularly to provide estimates on the number of individuals that require assistance during an evacuation.
- 6. **CEMP and Hazard Mitigation Plans** Coordinate with MEMA to increase the access to CEMP and Hazard Mitigation Plans. Improve the redundancy and accessibility of the electronic interface used to view the plans and ensure that multiple copies of plans are accessibile to emergency officials.
- Improve procedures and guidelines Work with MEMA and emergency officials in western Massachusetts to develop formalized evacuation procedures and protocols. Procedures should be based on the resources and data identified in this plan.

8. **Evacuation Signs –** Local Communities and the Massachusetts Department of Transportation may want to consider placement of Evacuation Route Signs (EM-1) as defined in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. These signs could be placed in key areas to direct motorists to the regional evacuation routes. The signs may provide the greatest benefit along the tertiary routes identified in this plan to assist in directing motorists to the secondary and primary evacuation routes.
