

# **AMHERST**

The Town of Amherst is a college town with historic, cultural and natural resources. These make Amherst an attractive and vibrant community for all ages. The town has evolved into a major educational and employment center, yet still maintains its small town charm.

Amherst is home to the oldest college in Western Massachusetts, Amherst College, which opened in 1821. Massachusetts Agricultural College, a land grant college and the only exclusively agricultural college in the country at the time, began in 1867. In the last fifty years, "Mass Aggie" evolved to become the University of Massachusetts, one of the region's largest employers and a nationally-recognized research institution. Hampshire College, created as an innovative alternative to Amherst College and the University of Massachusetts, is the area's newest college, and was founded in 1970.

Amherst has a town center with a broad array of shops, restaurants, and cafes. A variety of housing choices exist in the town, and the town is served by the Pioneer Valley Transit authority (PVTA), the regional public transit service. More recently, the town has begun attracting a number of technology-based companies.

The Dickinson Homestead and Emily Dickinson Museum, home to 19th century poet Emily Dickinson, is a National Historic Landmark owned by Amherst College. The Jones Library, the town's public library, contains special collections of Emily Dickinson's work as well as that of poet Robert Frost, who once taught at Amherst College. The Pratt Museum of Natural History at Amherst College holds one of the world's finest collections of dinosaur tracks, fossils, and meteorites. The Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art and the Yiddish Book Center are adjacent to the Hampshire College campus, attracting visitors throughout the year. During the summer months, the town hosts craft fairs, farmer's markets and a variety of art and literary events.
