# **Pioneer Valley Region**

The Pioneer Valley Region is comprised of Hampden and Hampshire Counties and is located in the Midwestern section of Massachusetts. In 2014, it was home to 626,775 residents and the fourth largest metropolitan area in New England. The region covers approximately 1,200 square miles, roughly equal to the size of the State of Rhode Island. There are 8 cities with a mayoral form of government and 35 towns, governed by Town Meeting.

The area is unique within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The Pioneer Valley Region offers a diverse economic base, internationally known educational institutions, and unparalleled scenic beauty. The Connecticut River, its fertile agricultural valley, and the foothills of the Berkshire Mountains are but some of the region's premier natural resources. Choices in lifestyles range from contemporary downtown living to stately historic homes, characteristic suburban neighborhoods, and rural living in very small communities.

Springfield, the third largest city in Massachusetts, is the region's cultural and economic center. The citiy of Holyoke was the first planned industrial community in the nation. The region has the headquarters or major plants of international companies including Hasbro, Solutia, Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company, Smith & Wesson, and Callaway Golf. Often referred to as the "Crossroads of New England," the Pioneer Valley region is located at the interchange of the Massachusetts Turnpike and Interstate 91. Air travel is provided by Bradley International Airport in Connecticut, a 30 minute, non-congested drive from Springfield.

Significant tourist attractions include the Basketball Hall of Fame, the Volleyball Hall of Fame, Mt. Tom State Park, the Eastern States Exposition, the largest agricultural fair in New England, and the picturesque college communities of Northampton and Amherst.
