4. Prepare Now for a More Resilient Community (AICP)

Be prepared! In addition to being the Boy Scout motto, both coastal and inland communities should also "Be prepared" for the impacts of climate change. From more intense storms, to hotter days and increased flooding, come and learn how communities can work collaboratively to plan, prepare for, and respond to climate challenges today and in the future.

5. Complete Streets (AICP)

"Complete streets" is a design approach that takes vehicles, pedestrians, bicyclists, and public transportation all into account in the planning, design, and operational processes when building or renovating streets, parks, sidewalks, and/or parking lots. Twenty-one Massachusetts cities and towns have adopted a complete streets policy to guide road design. The Massachusetts Department of Transportation's fiscal 2016 capital budget has allocated \$12.5 million to its Complete Streets Certification Program to support municipalities in these efforts. Funds will be awarded to municipalities that have enacted a local policy and have applied to design, build, and/or rehabilitate specific roadway projects that provide better mobility options for all users.

6. Will Your Community's Sign Bylaw Survive a Legal Challenge? (MIIA)(AICP)

This session will analyze the findings in a recent Supreme Court ruling (Reed v Town of Gilbert) that invalidated portions of the Town of Gilbert sign by-law. The findings in Reed v Gilbert will have a significant impact nationwide on how communities draft sign bylaws. The presenters will discuss some ways to create bylaws that do not conflict with Reed v Gilbert and other helpful tips for crafting sign by-laws.

8. The Guidebook to Massachusetts Land Use Planning (MIIA)(AICP)

The American Planning Association–Massachusetts Chapter has hired Bob Mitchell, FAICP, Planning Consultant, and Bob Ritchie, Attorney, to create a new comprehensive Massachusetts Guidebook to land use, planning, zoning, and subdivision. The Guidebook will also include open meetings, public records, administration and meetings, federal land use topics, and a number of other state statutes related to land use. It will provide clearer descriptions of the language of various state statutes, such as Chapter 40A and Chapter 41.The Guidebook will be a PDF document with links to the most important court cases and to relevant state statutes. It will include tables and charts explaining various procedures for land use permits, such as special permits, variances and subdivisions. It will have step-by-step single-page Action Date tables that boards and staff can print out and use for their reviews of particular permits. The Guidebook will become the primary resource for the Massachusetts planning community.

9. Site Plan Review (MIIA)(AICP)

The Zoning Act does not contain any provisions for the review of site plans; however, the Site Plan Review process can be a very effective tool to review the details, aesthetics, and impacts of a potential project. This course explains the difference between site plan approval and special permits; the review process; the types of conditions that may be imposed; reasons for disapproval; the appeal process; and the types of information a town can require to be shown on a site plan.

10. Stormwater Regulations Update— Is Your Community Ready? (AICP)

This session will provide the latest information on the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer (MS4) permit, how you can help your community comply, and options for minimizing and managing the costs. This session will trace the life of a Chapter 40B development from Project Eligibility through the Comprehensive Permit process to Final Approval, Construction, and ongoing Affordability Monitoring. Roles and responsibilities of the Subsidizing Agency, the Zoning Board of Appeals, other town officials, and the developer will be reviewed, together with a primer on state regulations, guidelines, and policies—and the differences between them.

15. Understanding Demolition Delay Bylaws (AICP)

First established by the City of Cambridge in 1979, demolition delay bylaws and ordinances have become an increasingly popular tool to address the loss of significant historic resources. Today, demolition delay bylaws and ordinances can be found in well over one-third of the cities and towns of Massachusetts. While only offering a window of opportunity to save a threatened historic building, demolition delay can be seen as effective yet limited. In this session, we will discuss how demolition delay bylaws and ordinances are established, the types of demolition delay found around the state, tips for effectively using demolition delay, success stories, and the larger context of tools to address the loss of community character.

16. Green Communities Program—Partnering with Massachusetts Cities and Towns (AICP)


The Green Communities Act created a program unique to Massachusetts that progressively encourages, challenges, and enables cities and towns of all sizes to reduce energy use and increase renewable energy. Since the program started, 155 cities and towns throughout Massachusetts have risen to the challenge and became designated as Green Communities. Over \$45 million dollars have been awarded as grants to these municipalities. This session will provide an overview of what it takes to become a Green Community and the benefits that accrue to those that do. Included will be an overview of those programs that are available to ALL municipalities whether they choose to become an official Green Community or not.

17. Does the Current Zoning Act Cause You Grief: A Facilitated Discussion (AICP)


